

The Word of the Laird



During the Easter Time in all three cycles of readings the first reading is always from the Acts of the Apostles. That book recounts the early history of those who believed that Jesus was the Messiah who brought in the last days and opened the way for God's Kingdom. In this year's cycle (C) the second reading is from the Book of Revelation.

In Judaism there was an understanding that before the days of God's Kingdom there would be a period of serious conflict between good and evil. In the Book of Revelation we find that conflict displayed through the conflicts and tensions brought about by the powers of evil. We need to remember that the early Christian community experienced persecution from both the Jews and the Romans. Up until the Romans destroyed the Jerusalem Temple in the year 70, the priesthood and the Pharisees were very clearly opposed to those who believed in Christ as the Messiah. In Rome, starting about the year 64 Christians were blamed for the fire that allegedly the Emperor Nero had set. The fact that Christians would not offer sacrifices to the Roman gods was also another issue that led to their persecution by the Romans.

All of this is reflected in various ways in the Book of Revelation. The figures of the "Son of Man" and the Lamb throughout so much of the book are reminders of the presence of Christ to His chosen people, those who put their faith in Him. The book concludes with the final victory of Christ over the powers of evil and adversity. You might find some online commentaries that would help in understanding this book more easily. I googled "The Book of Revelation, Catholic Commentaries" and it yielded 274,000 results!!! Some of them are videos which make for easy watching.

Thanks be to God. Alleluia! Alleluia!

A NOTE FROM YOUR DIRECTOR OF FAITH FORMATION AND YOUTH MINISTRY:

Dear Church Family,

This weekend, we celebrate the **3rd Sunday of Easter**. Have you noticed that there are no Old Testament readings during the Easter season? We have no Hebrew scriptures, but instead we read from the Acts of the Apostles, and this is done to place our focus on the Resurrection. During the year C Lectionary, the second readings come from the Book of Revelation, and our Gospel readings come from John.

Fr. Laird suggested we read the Gospel of John during the Easter season, and I would like to reiterate that. Why? **J.R. Heimbigner**, in his article, **Why Is The Gospel Of John Different?** says, "John's Gospel tells a story of who Jesus was, the others tell us what he said and did. Jesus is described in different metaphors, which isn't done in the others. Of the eight recorded miracles in the Gospel of John, six are completely independent of the other Gospels. It focuses a great deal on Jesus being the Son of God through the "I AM" statements. John records specific conversations and the details of those conversations with different people. The story plot is different as well, not starting with the baptism of Jesus, and following different events that are not discussed in the other Gospels." In my humble opinion, John's Gospel gives us Jesus. We meet him and get to know him in a more intimate way. It's so worth your time to read it on your own, as it deepens your relationship with Jesus, allowing you to understand him in (maybe) a different way than you did before.

In today's Gospel passage from St. John, after the resurrection, Jesus again comes to his disciples on the seashore. There he repeatedly asks Peter, "Do you love me?" And each time after Peter answers, Jesus tells him to "Feed my sheep." Our message here seems simple – if we choose to follow Jesus, just as his disciples did, then we must care for his sheep. Whatever life gives us, difficulty, hardship, joy – we should always approach it and respond with the love of Jesus. Everything we do must be done out of that love.
